

Common Goby

Pomatoschistus microps

Fish · Here all year · spawns Apr–Aug



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A small, slender, sandy-coloured fish with fine dark speckling, two dorsal fins and — the family's defining feature — pelvic fins fused into a suction disc on the underside. Common gobies live in the shallow, muddy and sandy margins of the Solway, in estuary pools, saltmarsh creeks and brackish ditches, and tolerate a wide range of salinity.

BEHAVIOUR

Gobies rest on the bottom rather than swimming freely, using the pelvic sucker to hold position, and dart in short bursts before settling again. They feed on small crustaceans and worms. Males guard eggs laid on the underside of a shell or stone, fanning them until they hatch. Their tolerance of brackish, muddy, variable water makes them one of the commonest small fish of the estuary edge.
